The proposed Ordinance would require the Charter Review Commission to convene every six years, rather than every eight years as currently required, with the next Charter Review Commission to be appointed not later than July 1, 2029, and every six years thereafter. The Charter Review Commission consists of fifteen County electors who review and present recommendations for amendment, revision or repeal of the Wakulla County Charter.
